<b>ALISA VO</b>			
<p>Hi, I am Alisa.</p> <p>I was sexually abused when I was 5 years old. When my mother and I reported the abuse to the police, we had to bounce around building to building to get the help and resources we needed.</p> <p>My mother and I were sent to many different places which added incredible stress to the already traumatic experience.</p> <p>Upon entering each building, I had to retell the horrific details of my abuse. So, in 2012, a group of community service providers decided to work together to create a better system. Their goal was to provide a coordinated approach to services where victims of abuse could tell their story and gain access to support services, all in one place. Alisa's Wish uses a multi-disciplinary team approach to support children and youth who have experienced abuse and/ or witnessed violence. The team at Alisa's Wish includes Maple Ridge/Pitt Meadows Community Services, Community-Based Victim Services, Ridge Meadows RCMP, the Ministry for Children and Family Development, Act 2 Child & Family Services, Cythera Transition House Society, and School District 42 working together to support and serve the children and youth of Maple Ridge, Pitt Meadows and Katzie First Nation." Hi I’m Corporal Christine Day. I’m a police officer with the serious crime unit at the Ridge Meadows RCMP detachment.  One of my jobs is that I’m the police liaison between the Ridge Meadows Detachment and Alisa’s Wish.  Police officers who interview children and youth at Alisa’s Wish are specially trained in forensic child interviewing. We want to ensure that we get the best statement possible so that your child only has to tell their story one time. Usually, there will be another police officer watching in a separate room to make sure that all of the details that we need for our investigation are captured in the first statement. We want to make sure that children and youth feel safe telling their stories to us here at Alisa’s Wish.
