Who Are Those White People Holding Black Lives Matters Signs?

Unitarians Demonstrate for Racial Justice

Surrey, BC – April 13

On any given Saturday, between 1 and 2 pm you'll see people (usually white) on the corner of 156th Street and 24th Avenue in Surrey demonstrating for racial justice. For the past year, rain or shine, a handful of locals have gathered at the corner to add action (and signs) to their beliefs that "Black Lives Matter" and "It's Time for Racial Justice".

The demonstrations are led by Rev. Samaya Oakley, Minister of South Fraser Unitarian Congregation. She says, "As Canadian Unitarian Universalists we envision a world in which our interdependence calls us to love and justice." For Rev. Samaya, this act of racial justice activism is a spiritual practice that she engages in each week to live out this vision.

About 140 cars pass by this intersection every 5 minutes. Reactions from drivers range from honking horns, waving, and shouts of agreement, to the occasional rude gesture or comment.
